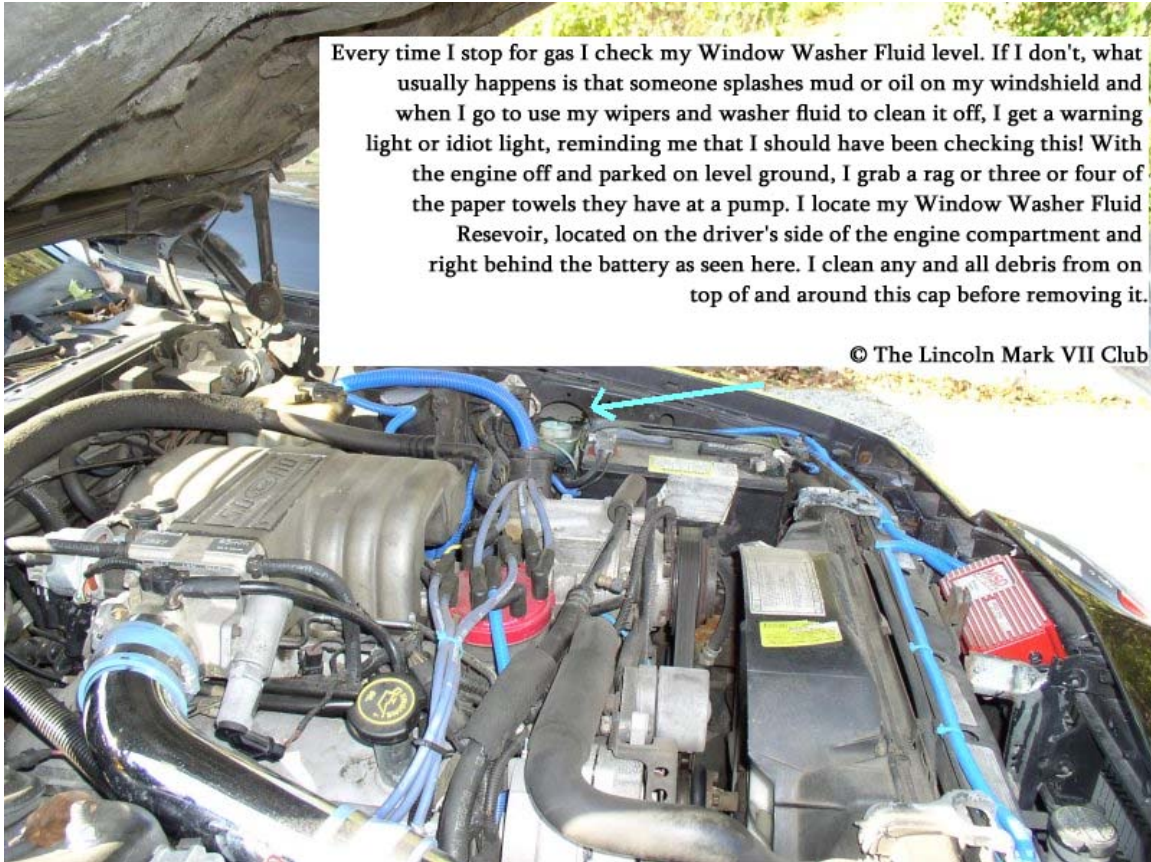


Lincoln Mark VII 1984 - 1992 Windshield Washer Fluid



Every time I stop for gas I check my Window Washer Fluid level. If I don't, what usually happens is that someone splashes mud or oil on my windshield and when I go to use my wipers and washer fluid to clean it off, I get a warning light or idiot light, reminding me that I should have been checking this! With the engine off and parked on level ground, I grab a rag or three or four of the paper towels they have at a pump. I locate my Window Washer Fluid Reservoir, located on the driver's side of the engine compartment and right behind the battery as seen here. I clean any and all debris from on top of and around this cap before removing it.

After removing the reservoir top, the only time that you will see fluid above the screen is when you have just overfilled the system :) Normally though, nothing can be seen here. The reason to fill the system is because you received a warning light when trying to clean the windshield or you just got nothing out the spray nozzles. In either case, a completely empty reservoir can hold up to one gallon of window washer fluid. If your warning light just came on, then you are about 1/2 gallon low. Not to worry though; this stuff has a LOW freezing point and is like really cheap. I think the gallon pictured here from AutoZone was like \$1.49 plus tax. Anyway, an adapted funnel works best here. (Like an oil funnel that's been cut so the tube is only about an inch long and very wide) Just remember to fill slowly as the fill area is really shallow!

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
